Number of Credit Hours The second numeral in a course number represents the number of undergraduate or graduate credit hours earned in that course.

Intensive Courses (IN) feature distance-based DIU Online (<https://online.diu.edu>) learning assignments for most of the term that the course is scheduled, plus a one or two-week period of on-campus full-day or half-day classroom periods which students are required to attend. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, some May and May Extended and Summer 2021 courses will allow students to attend the intensive portion via Zoom. Check the Course Schedule in the “Attendance via Zoom Allowed” column to see if attendance via Zoom for the intensive portion is allowed. Additional assignments are often required during the on-campus time.

Online Courses (OL) are conducted entirely via DIU Online (<https://online.diu.edu>). These courses do not have a scheduled class time but allow students the freedom to work at any time of day. Online courses are not self-paced, however, as students are required to meet deadlines for assignments and activities. Some OL courses require occasional Zoom meetings that are scheduled at the students’ convenience.

Synchronous Learning Courses (SL) allow students to attend DIU courses virtually. SL students attend class using Zoom video conferencing software. Attendance during the scheduled class time is required. Assignments and other activities can be submitted via DIU Online (<https://online.diu.edu>). Some SL courses are only taught via Zoom with no on-campus class section.

IMPORTANT NOTICES:

1. ALL non-IN and all non-OL courses will be offered synchronously via Zoom. Many, but not all, of these will also be offered on-campus face to face. as TOC courses (having no course number suffix). **Note the exception to this general rule for AA5934.**
2. Courses listed with -SL after the course number will be offered synchronously only, with no on-campus option.
2. Due to the uncertainty of the COVID-19 situation, *selected* or *all* on-campus courses could be switched to synchronous-only courses at any time. Selected courses could be switched if the instructor determines they cannot teach in person for some reason.
3. Due to 6-foot physical-distancing restrictions that will be in effect for those who attend on-campus courses, there will be an enrollment cap on the number of students in on-campus courses, depending on the classroom used. After the enrollment cap is reached, the on-campus course will be closed in Campus Café, and any other students desiring to enroll for that course will need to enroll in the -SL (synchronous) version of the course. There is currently no enrollment cap on synchronous courses.

AC5398 Culture & Community
