Number of Credit Hours The second numeral in a course number represents the number of undergraduate or graduate credit hours earned in that course.

Intensive Courses (IN) feature distance-based Canvas learning assignments for most of the term that the course is scheduled, plus a one or two-week period of on-campus full-day or half-day classroom periods which students are required to attend in person unless otherwise specified. Additional assignments are often required during the on-campus time.

Online Courses (OL) are conducted entirely Online via Canvas. These courses do not have a scheduled class time but allow students the freedom to work at any time of day. Online courses are not self-paced, as students are required to meet deadlines for assignments and activities. Some OL courses require occasional, weekly, or biweekly Zoom meetings that are scheduled at the students' convenience.

Synchronous Learning Courses (SL) allow students to attend DIU courses virtually. SL students attend class using Zoom video conferencing software. Attendance during the scheduled class time with video turned on is required. Assignments and other activities can be submitted via Canvas. Some SL courses are only taught via Zoom with no On-Campus class section – these are marked as **-SL**.

On-Campus-Only Courses (C) Courses marked on the published course schedule with a -C suffix are offered only on the DIU campus and are not available synchronously.

NOTE: Unless a course is marked as -IN or -OL or -SL or -C, it will be offered BOTH On-Campus and Synchronously via Zoom. -SL after a course number means that course is ONLY taught via Zoom and does not meet On-Campus.

Course Description

AL 5398 Course Description - Role and Reference Grammar (RRG) is a framework for language analysis that integrates syntax, semantics, pragmatics, and discourse. It is applicable to any language (not Euro-centric) and has proven to be an insightful tool in analyzing language structures. In this course, we learn to approach language data from the perspective of syntax, semantics, pragmatics, and discourse. We start each topic with data sets, and then move on to analyze a Project Text from a previously-unknown language. Prerequisite: AL4410 Principles of Grammatical Analysis or AL5301 Morphosyntax.
